Our brief

- Pull together Scottish nationwide quantitative research and qualitative opinion research on the attitudes of residents living in **East Dunbartonshire** towards housing;
- Explore the current housing situation and challenges facing local residents, and their hopes and aspirations for the future;
- Provide an evidence base to inform the East Dunbartonshire Local Plan consultation process.





Over 15,000 new homes are needed in East Dunbartonshire in the next ten years.

Our approach

In January 2024, Homes for Scotland published a comprehensive survey of 13,690 people. It found **over a quarter of households in Scotland (28%) face one or more forms of housing need**.

We have also worked with **Just Build Homes** to better understand the views and attitudes of those living in **East Dunbartonshire** who want to see more homes built in the area.



Key findings

- Almost a quarter of households in Scotland (23%) are struggling to cope with increasing household costs.
- Nearly one in five (19%) would like to move out of their existing household to find a home of their own.
- Nearly nine out of ten young people (87%) living at home would like to move out to find a home of their own.



- One in ten people in 'concealed households'* would like to 'downsize' as they require less space.
- There is a lack of suitable housing for older people who want to 'downsize'.
- Local people in East Dunbartonshire want to see more homes built locally, because it will:
 - help younger people get onto the housing ladder
 - provide affordable housing
 - address the local housing shortage
 - help existing residents stay in the area, benefitting local shops and businesses and paying local council tax in East Dunbartonshire.


Scottish housing attitudes including those living in East Dunbartonshire

Housing costs


Almost a quarter of households (23%) in Scotland are struggling to cope with increasing household costs.

Nearly nine out of ten young adults living at home in Scotland would like to move out to a home of their own.




Fig 3: Reasons for concealed households


- Young adult(s) living at home who would like their own home

Downsizing

One in ten people in a household in Scotland identified as having 'hidden needs' say that they would like to 'downsize' as they require less space, but are unable to do so because of the lack of suitable housing.





There is a huge sector of the population that is being overlooked, they are not in the houses they want to be and are unable to live their lives to the full, starting relationships, having families etc because we are not counting them in the first place.

The situation with my stepson highlights the urgent need for more housing. He, like many others, finds it impossible to get onto the property ladder due to the lack of homes available. It's a distressing reality that he might have to wait for an inheritance to own a house. This underlines the necessity for action to provide accessible housing options for everyone.




Who did we speak to?




Fig 6: Engagement map of local supporters



Housing status


75% of those who believe that housing should be prioritised in the Local Plan are existing homeowners.





Downsizing

Over one in five of those we spoke to believe that there is lack of suitable housing available in East Dunbartonshire for older people who are looking to 'downsize'.

One in five of those we spoke to are currently looking to rent or buy in the local area.







Fig 10: Housing needs for younger people



The shortage of housing means many end up staying with parents longer than they should. I believe there's a need for more homes to be in our local plans, especially ones that are affordable for those with regular jobs.

The council needs to focus on providing more housing, with some specifically aimed at assisting young people. It's about creating a fair chance for them to own a home and start building their future without being weighed down by an unaffordable market.



Recommendations



Recommendation 1

East Dunbartonshire Council should develop a credible and robust Local Plan that addresses the stark findings of local housing need contained within this report.





Recommendation 2

East Dunbartonshire Council should hold consultation workshops with young people and renters – the groups that face the highest levels of housing need but who are universally unheard in Local Plan and formal planning consultations.





Recommendation 3

The East Dunbartonshire Local Plan should incorporate a **powerful strategy to support 'downsizing'** - to help older residents find quality housing that meets their needs, and helps free up family housing for younger people.

Methodology

The quantitative research contained within this report comes from Homes for Scotland's groundbreaking Existing Housing Need in Scotland survey, undertaken by The Diffley Partnership and Rettie & Co and published on 22 January 2024.

They surveyed 13,690 people across Scotland including 274 residents living in East Dunbartonshire. We are grateful to Homes for Scotland, The Diffley Partnership and Rettie & Co for sharing the data sets which we have presented as part of this report.
